Critical Thinking Collaboration







Why Now?

 Schools must make a full-throttled commitment to teaching the skills of creativity and innovation to meet the needs of present and future careers.

 Schools have reduced ability to provide learning transfer experiences. Limitations imposed by time, general funding, and added curricular requirements contribute.

 Systemically increase availability, reinforce traditional learning, and increase learning transfer opportunity for all LMHS students. Provision of an onsite, project-based, strand-focused (subject-area interest) learning model effectively serves the mission.

 Conceptual planning for an onsite experiential learning program began in earnest in 2018. Planning has advanced substantially since August. Details of execution will be completed over the next seven months.



Venture Academics

Works like this...

Project-based teaching is provided in strands. Strands are designed as immersive experiences in defined content-areas with defined content-associated coursework.

At inauguration, 5 teachers will staff Venture Center and work with students in semester-long, 3-hour super blocks. Project-based teachers lead strand learning in half-day, semester-long increments.

Planned strands include Graphic Arts, Life Science, Business Foundations, Advanced Business, Behavioral Science, Writing, Health, Earth Science, Environmental Science, and Government and Law.



Venture Academics


Works like this...

Each strand will include complementary coursework totaling 15 content-area credits and 5 project-work credits. Projects will be supported by community advisors, mentors, or partners.

Students will attend to strand learning in semester-long, half-day blocks of time. As an example, standards for Health I and Health II would be met through direct instruction, collaboration, and health-related project work during Semester 1 of 2021-2022 from 1 to 4 pm.

Teachers track student performance on learning outcomes and advise student project work.

Students earn course credit by demonstrating proficiency on course priority standards.



Planning (key to the following ...)

<u>Unit of Instruction</u> — one unit is the equivalent of one-half of a full-year-skinny course or a single-quarter of a block class

<u>FTE</u> – Full time equivalent, equates to the number of teachers needed, each teacher may teach 12 units o)f instruction

<u>Course Number</u> – SCI541, establishes the department affiliation and course placement in the LMHS sequence

<u>SCED Code</u> – *School Courses for the Exchange of Data* code – required by the Iowa Department of Education to accurately define course content, determines required teacher endorsements necessary to teach courses, only appropriately endorsed teachers may award course credit

<u>Standards</u> – expected learnings

<u>Standard proficiency</u> – defined level of learning(s) necessary to earn course credit

The State of Iowa requires Project-Based Learning courses (as well as online, blended, and traditional) and teachers of courses to meet defined criteria to provide course credit. LMCSD requires students to demonstrate priority learning to earn course credit.

- <u>10 strands offered</u> Advanced Business, Behavioral Science, Business Foundations, Earth Science, Environmental Science, Government and Law, Graphic Arts, Health Science, Life Science, and Writing.
- Most strands include an <u>English</u> (reading, writing, or communication) component.
- Strands earn 20 credits per term (in the traditional setting, full loads for full day terms equate to 80 credits, 250 are needed to graduate).

Updates from the Cabinet January 11, 2020

Cabinet Members: Superintendent Bisgard, Assoc. Superintendent Wear, Mrs. Karla Christian (HR), Mr. JT Anderson (CFO), Mrs. Leisa Breitfelder (Student Services), and Mrs. Jeri Ramos (Tech)

At-Risk/Dropout Prevention Application 2022: The process for approval of at-risk/dropout prevention modified supplemental funding requires the board to pass a resolution with the applicable calculated amount, which is determined by taking the district's certified enrollment (7,597.9) times the district's cost per pupil (\$7,048) times 2.5%. For FY2022, the amount requested is \$1,338,750.

Summary of Revisions to 2021-22 School Year Calendar:

- 1. New Teacher Orientation: Moved to the two days before all staff begin.
- 2. Personalized Professional Learning Days: Exchanged for regular professional learning days due to the derecho and not having professional learning this year. There are a lot of district priorities that need to have time provided for so teachers can learn and collaborate.
- 3. Half Work Days on August 26th and May 27th: These were changed to full work days in order to meet the 191 teacher contract days.
- 4. All schools will dismiss two hours early on conference days to align schedules and transportation.

School Board Meeting Minutes December 14, 2020

100: Call to Order and Determination of a Quorum

The Linn-Mar School Board meeting was called to order at 5:00 PM in the boardroom of the Learning Resource Center (2999 N 10th St, Marion) and via YouTube. Roll was taken to determine a quorum. Present: Buchholz, Isenberg, Lausen, Morey, Nelson, and Weaver. Absent: Wall. Administration present: Bisgard, Anderson, Christian, Ramos, Breitfelder, and Wear.

200: Adoption of the Agenda Motion 076-12-14

MOTION by Weaver to adopt the agenda, as presented. Second by Lausen. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

300: Audience Communications

Board Secretary/Treasurer JT Anderson read the following seven audience communications that were submitted electronically:

- 2. Heather Rutan, LM parent, request to return to in-person learning;
- 3. Dan & Steffanie Drey, LM parents, request to remain in hybrid learning after winter break;

- 6. Jessica Seim, LM parent, request to return to in-person learning; and
- 7. Alan Rutan, LM parent, request to return to in-person learning and busing for students on Oak Savannah Court.

400: Informational Reports, Discussions, and Presentations

401: Update from Linn-Mar High School – Exhibit 401.1

Dr. Jeff Gustason, Principal of LM High School, reported on the structure of learning at the high school level from 1996 forward, the learning structure in place today, and what future learning could look like at the high school level. Highlights were shared regarding the learning structure in 1996 thru 2010 and 2010 thru 2020; including some specifics on what has remained the same and what has changed. Gustason also shared information on what could happen from 2020-2030, with focus on expected learning growth for all students utilizing student-choice learning options that could include a mixture of traditional learning, blended learning, online learning, and project-based learning formats.

402: Marion City Council

Lausen reported that during the December 3rd Marion City Council meeting there were no topics presented that had a direct impact on the district.

403: Cabinet Update & Review of Return-to-Learn Plan – Exhibit 403.1

Superintendent Shannon Bisgard reported on the GWAEA superintendents' legislative meeting that included 17 lowa legislators. The focus of the meeting was legislative priorities for the 2021 session that included topics such as internet access for all students, the supplemental state aid amount, declining school enrollment numbers and related budgetary issues, and the need to assist students in "catching up" from all things COVID.

Bisgard also reported that working with the Linn County Department of Public Health regarding COVID has been a great partnership; as well as with St. Luke's and Mercy. LCPH shared information with the metro superintendents regarding COVID vaccinations that will start on a two-tiered process with emergency health providers (including school nurses) receiving the first tier of vaccinations and the second tier to include school personnel. Additional clarification is pending on who "school personnel" covers. Bisgard also shared that districts cannot require school personnel to receive the vaccination at this time.

Bisgard then facilitated a discussion on the Return-to-Learn Plan format that will be utilized upon returning from winter break on January 4th. Bisgard made the recommendation for PreK-6th grades to utilize a "soft start" with A/B Hybrid Learning for a week (either 4 days or 6 days so the A/B days will be equitable) and then return to in-person learning. Bisgard clarified that grades 7th-12th would continue utilizing the A/B Hybrid Learning model through the end of second quarter (January 29th) as previously approved by the board. The board was in agreement with the "soft start" return for PreK-6th grades for four days; with the return to in-person learning on Friday, January 8th.

500: Unfinished Business

501: Approval of Return-to-Learn Plan *Motion 077-12-14*

MOTION by Buchholz to approve the Return-to-Learn Plan, as discussed, which includes PreK-6th grades utilizing A/B Hybrid Learning from January 4th thru 7th; and returning to in-person learning on Friday, January 8th. Second by Weaver.

Bisgard clarified, again, that 7th-12th grades will continue in A/B Hybrid Learning through the end of second quarter (January 29th) as previously approved by the board and that the board will begin discussing the learning format to be utilized for third quarter for 7th-12th grades during the January 11th board meeting. Bisgard also reported that communication on the board's decision will be distributed to families and staff tomorrow.

Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

<u>502: Second Reading of Policy Recommendations</u> – Exhibit 502.1 <u>Motion 078-12-14</u> **MOTION** by Weaver to approve the second reading of the policy recommendations, as presented. Second by Lausen. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

600: New Business:

601: Approval of FY2020 CAFR – Exhibit 601.1 *Motion 079-12-14*

JT Anderson, Chief Financial/Operating Officer, reported on the FY2020 Comprehensive Annual Finance Report prior to presentation to the school board for approval. Auditor recommendations included: 1) Additional monitoring of credit card compliance by employees, 2) Provision of additional oversight on activity accounts, 3) Enhancing payroll functions/distribution of duties, and 4) Additional monitoring of negative meal accounts (Currently at approximately \$30,000).

MOTION by Buchholz to approve the Comprehensive Annual Finance Report for fiscal year 2020, as presented. Second by Lausen. Suggestion shared to promote donations to cover negative meal balances. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

602: Letting of Bus Bids Motion 080-12-14

MOTION by Lausen to approve the letting of bus bids for a total cost not to exceed \$550,000. Second by Weaver. Anderson clarified the money would be used to purchase three regular buses and one lift bus; all of which are propane, for approximately \$110,000 to \$115,000 each. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

603: Approval of 2021-22 Physical Education Standards Exemption Motion 081-12-14

MOTION by Lausen to approve the 2021-22 Physical Education Standards Exemption, per CASA requirements, to teach high school physical education in a 90-minute block, quarter format instead of the traditional semester format. Second by Buchholz. Bisgard clarified this is an annual renewal required by CASA with no changes in current learning format. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.

604: Approval of Fundraisers – Exhibit 604.1 Motion 082-12-14

MOTION by Lausen to approve the LM High School Lion Food Pantry fundraiser, as presented. Second by Weaver. Voice vote, all ayes. Motion carried.
